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# **Keynote speakers**

## **Keynote Address**

#### **Dr Rachel Grieve**

Rachel completed her PhD in Cognitive Psychology at the Queensland University of Technology, and she currently based at the University of Tasmania. Her program of research includes evidence-based learning and teaching, as well as emotion, motivation, and cyberpsychology. She is an experienced science communicator and her work has featured as a cover story in New Scientist.

## **Diversity Panel**

#### **Graham Davis**

Graham has been the witness assistance service manager for the Director of Prosecutions in Tasmania since 2008. The service works with victims and vulnerable witnesses in serious criminal matters. Before this he worked as a teacher and counsellor in both government and private schools for over twenty years. His main teaching area was legal studies and he has always had a particular interest in teaching about Australia's legal and political systems.

## **Lucy Hunt and Kate Taylor**

Lucy and Kate are Autism Consultants working in Tasmanian Government schools in the south of the State, supporting students from Kinder to Grade 12 with Autism. They work with teachers and school teams to build systemic capacity to deliver ongoing and improved educational outcomes for students with Autism. They also work to empower school staff to understand and teach with high expectations, for the academic, social and emotional wellbeing of students with Autism.

#### Lynne Maher

Lynne has been actively involved in the committee of the Tasmanian Association for the Gifted for 18 years, including 9 years as President. She is Tasmanian Director and treasurer for the National Association, AAEGT. A qualified and experienced teacher with experience teaching, training and facilitating learning with all ages, Lynne's knowledge of gifted education expanded as she advocated for her gifted son and continued to develop as her involvement with state and national gifted associations continued. She has conducted local information sessions for educators and parents; professional development for teachers in Tasmania and overseas; and presentations at state, national and world conferences.

## **Aaron Roberts**

Aaron is currently employed by *The Smith Family* to deliver the Learning for Life program across low socio communities in Tasmania. He has previously worked as a teacher and has also worked for a decade with the Australian Sports Commission to increase levels of physical activity amongst Australian school aged children. Aaron has a passion to engage schools and communities in using strength based approaches and innovation to solve barriers to education.


