

Our Organisation

- Within the Parliamentary Service, Education Services operates as one part of the Visitor and Support Services branch within a wider group called Precinct Services.
- Unlike certain other jurisdictions, Education Services does not sit within Office of the Clerk.
- We have undergone a number of organisational changes recently. Visitor and Support Services has five team leaders in charge of the day-to-day operations. Team leaders report to the Visitor and Support Services Manager (and former Lead Educator) Miranda Thomson.

The five business units are:


- 1. Education Services
- 2. Visitor Centre (includes public tours)
- 3. Displays and Collections (includes art tours)
- 4. Reception and Telephone Services
- 5. Mail and Distribution (newest addition)
- We have a re-vamped visitor centre, although there is no longer a souvenir/gift shop.
 Instead, there is a small selection of Parliament branded merchandise available for purchase. There is free Wi-Fi available for visitor use and there will also be a small coffee and food outlet in the visitor centre due to open in December.

General

- We continue to place an emphasis on active citizenship and youth participation
- We keep up-to-date regarding inquiry learning, the NZ teaching curriculum, NCEA ('social action' credits at senior secondary school) current teaching pedagogy and teacher best practice
- We look for meaningful opportunities to connect with other educational providers to provide connected visits – so, Education at Parliament, Government House, and the Supreme Court meet regularly to seek out information and gather ideas concerning connected visits
- Our standard visit time is **90 mins (1.5 hours)** or shorter **(60 mins)** to fit schedules/ESOL
- We can do **six** visits maximum per day (3 staff one each in the morning / one each in the afternoon)
- The maximum allowable group size is set at 42 for security and health and safety purposes
- Other programmes are: Role-plays and 'Eye on the Hive' with a focus on the media
- Core business is: Primary Year 6 through to secondary Year 10
- We also welcome local tertiary and overseas tertiary groups (mostly from the USA)
- And ESOL (Japanese, as well as others)
- Afternoons automatically include **20 minutes of 'Question Time'** as standard for groups on sitting days
- Provision for electorate/constituency MP visits to our Education Centre at the school's request, depending on availability
- **NZ Business & Parliament Trust** still provides **travel assistance funding** for students attending school in Years 6 to 9, however, all applications are considered. Priority is given to schools further away from Wellington, first time school visits and other special/exceptional circumstances.

- Held every two years, primarily for secondary school Social Studies teachers/educators
- The (October) 2017 conference was hosted in Napier

Attending from all around New Zealand, there were:

- 231 delegates attending
- **148** schools represented
- 20 different sponsor and exhibitor companies

- "Developing Global Citizens"
- "Think globally, act locally"

- Provide a joint workshop and information stand for teachers alongside the National Library, using connected visits and petitions as contexts for learning
- Network and gather information/visit feedback
- Learn about how parliament/government is being taught by some of the best teachers in the country!
- Provide general visit information and teacher resource packs.


Current resources

- Education Services now plays an 8 minute video as a standard part of the pre-tour introduction in the Education Centre
- This video is also **publicly available** on our website for schools/teachers to view pre or post visit
- Our curriculum-linked resources continue to be available to schools in hard-copy format for mailing out on request, or on our website in PDF.

Future Focus

- There has been new government-commissioned independent research (2016/17) released by the Ministry for Culture and Heritage concerning the nature and scope of publicly available CCE resources across providers/organisations/levels in NZ with a view to creating a hub for all central government related teaching resources and streamlining this information to create improved confidence/accessibility for teachers
- Parliamentary Service (Education Services), Office of the Clerk and Microsoft have piloted a 'Build Parliament with Minecraft' initiative whereby student interest in Parliament is triggered through the use of Microsoft's Minecraft 3D video game
- Judge Andrew Becroft from Office of the Children's Commissioner visited Parliament earlier this year to talk to staff about how to make institutions such as Parliament more child-centred in their thinking. See also http://www.occ.org.nz/listening2kids/
- March 5 2017 will be **Children's Day** in NZ. http://www.childrensday.org.nz/. We are looking at various initiatives within the Visitor and Support Services group to highlight young people and their contributions (parliamentary displays, art work)
- We are looking to create a 'Passport to Parliament' booklet resource for use with our youngest visitors – aged 5 to 12
- Generally, Education Services is keen to develop its overall resourcing over the next 3-5 years to increase capacity, to best keep up-to-date with the latest trends in education, particularly in terms of technology. We will also be doing a general 'stock-take' of existing programmes based on research/feedback, look to provide a more student-friendly online/web presence, implement an online booking system for schools, investigate the use of video links/Skype for remote/rural schools and will be making general/incremental tweaks/changes to our unit based on survey feedback from our customers.
